

# The Pupil Premium

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## Coverage

Chew Valley had 54 pupils in Years 7-11 claiming free school meals and therefore eligible for the Pupil Premium grant in the academic year 2011-12.

## Usage to date

The pupil premium has been used to support the following provision in school:

Provision	Coverage
Study Camp	Five eligible students (Y11)
One-to-one tuition	Four eligible students (Y8)
Subsidy for educational visits (travel)	All students eligible; used to support Inspector Calls Trip, Tate Gallery Trip and others

In addition, the Pupil Premium funds have contributed towards the work provided by:

- TA / LSA team in-class support and withdrawal
- Behaviour support
- Counselling support

## Impact

The purpose of the pupil premium is to assist schools in effectively “narrowing the gap” between the achievement of those pupils in receipt of FSM and other pupils nationally.

2010: the gap between the contextual value added scores for pupils with FSM and all pupils was 0.7 (in other words we added more value to pupils with FSM than the average for all pupils).

2011: the gap in value added (non-contextual) at CVS was -2.7 compared with -18.8 nationally.

2012: value added scores will be published in December 2012. In the summer KS4 results 2012 4 of the 12 FSM pupils achieved 5A\*-C with English and Maths; all achieved 5A\*-G. The within-school gap in GCSE Capped Points Scores was 49.78, down from 89.9 in 2011 and well below the reported national gap in 2011 of 79.4. 50% of FSM pupils made the expected progress in English, and the same in Maths, generating a within-school gap of 25.5% in Maths and 23.9% in English. These are both below the national gaps of 26% in English and 33% in Maths reported in 2011.

It is worth noting that in 2010 the cohort for analysis was two pupils; in 2011 it was only one; in 2012 there were twelve (1.5% of the cohort).
